

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### A STROKE OF LUCK FOR THESE NEW North Bergen Aphasia Communication Group Participants





Our newest Aphasia Communication Group in North Bergen is unique from the other nine groups Adler Aphasia Center offers throughout NJ. The program is facilitated in Spanish by a bilingual speech-language pathologist. The group is made up of not just people with aphasia, but their caregivers: their sisters, their aunts, and their aides. Caregivers are highly encouraged to attend this group's meetings.

For most of these stroke survivors with aphasia, this is the first time they've ever heard of the word aphasia and have met others with this communication disorder. In addition to the many topics this group offers, they are also receiving introductory lessons on what aphasia is and are given communication strategies they can practice at home. For many of them, this is also the first time they've met with a speech therapist to help explain their rights as people with aphasia.

Isabel, sister to Rafael who has aphasia, described in a recent meeting how difficult it has been to get her brother the appropriate help. She describes how his words were seemingly disappearing and that despite having taken him to multiple doctors as well as enrolling him in local senior groups, he was not happy and was not participating. "This group today has given us hope. We know what aphasia is now. No one *EVER* spoke the word "aphasia" to us, even when they referred us to this group." Other members described similar journeys and are now excited to see what the future holds for themselves and for their group of newfound friends.

These participants at North Bergen, which meets twice a month in the North Bergen Public Library, are reaching out to one another to find information about where to find individual speech therapy and other understanding medical professionals. They are excited about spreading the Adler Aphasia Center's mission to help find others in their community with aphasia and giving them the opportunity to meaningfully connect so that they can build a better quality of life as a family.



# OUR MEMBERS KNOW NO BOUNDS!

e see the benefits our members are experiencing with the choices they are making in their lives, thanks to their improved communication skills and confidence. Several members are choosing to venture out beyond their own communities by meeting up with others at events where adaptive activities are offered, while some are boldly going where no others have gone!

Seven of our members and caregivers attended the *No Barriers Summit* in Lake Tahoe, CA where they were surrounded by a community of others with disabilities of every kind.

The purpose of this annual summit, in which our Center's members and caregivers chose to attend en masse to support each other, was to show attendees that the human spirit does transcend barriers. The summit offered attendees more than 40 adaptive activities to try, an opportunity to hear motivational speakers, and an introduction to innovative technologies and products that are breaking barriers. Our members signed up for hiking, biking, falconry, white water rafting, scuba diving, boxing, archery, meditation and extreme kite flying, enabling them to go beyond their comfort level in trying new experiences, further building their confidence and esteem. Empowering our members to return to active lives and participate in events like these are the very goals of our Center's mission.

One of our members with aphasia who attended this summit said "I would never have tried this without Adler... they gave me confidence to try again." Another said "It changed my life and now I feel I can do anything."

We are proud of our members who are rebuilding their confidence, selfesteem and communication skills while building new lives, through our Life Participation Approach to Aphasia.

### Center members have weekly volunteer DATE at JEWISH HOME IN ROCKLEIGH

**S** ince 2011, Center members Ken Albrecht, Bob Mayer, Walt Nolting, Javed Ispahany, Vinnie Filippini and volunteer Richard Graves have been volunteering almost every Friday at the Jewish Home Gift Shop in Rockleigh, NJ. Several days a week, this team, dubbed "The Wolfpack," and several dozen other members with aphasia gather as part of our memberrun boutique called *Something Special* to design and craft gifts, jewelry and a couture line of jewelry. *Something Special* was founded in 2009 as a way to re-engage members in creative, hands-on, meaningful vocational work that gives them the opportunity to go out in the community to sell their

handcrafted pieces, practice their communication skills while talking to buyers about aphasia and give back to the Center. Since the program's inception, proceeds, which support the Center's Scholarship Fund, have almost reached the \$400,000 mark.

When the Jewish Home offered to feature and sell *Something Special's* products, "The Wolfpack" learned that the gift shop desperately needed volunteers to man the shop on Fridays. That's when they took action and became part of the Jewish Home's volunteer corps, averaging several hundred hours of volunteer time each year. On Fridays, they not only talk to customers about their jewelry and other gift shop items, practicing their newfound communication skills they acquired at the Center, but they raise awareness about aphasia at every opportunity they can find. To date, the team has sold more than \$25,000 in products at this site.

If you ever find yourself near the Jewish Home on a Friday, drop by and talk to "The Wolfpack." You can't miss them! Walt will be the 93-year old modelling the jewelry either in the gift shop or down the hall at their in-house salon, where the ladies have come to expect his weekly visits. And Javed will be the one offering you a big hug as you browse the gift shop.

# SURVEY says!

Each year, our members take a brief survey to share how their lives have changed since joining the Center at both our Maywood and West Orange locations. The results of the most recent survey are in for Maywood's members with aphasia, and we wanted to share some of these results with you. Since joining the Center:

95% of members surveyed reported that they <u>maintained</u> or improved their communication skills
98% of members surveyed reported that they <u>maintained</u> or increased their knowledge of aphasia
98% of members surveyed reported that they <u>maintained</u> or improved their friendships with others
94% of members surveyed reported that they <u>maintained or</u> <u>improved</u> their <b>participation in recreational activities</b>
94% of members surveyed reported that they <u>maintained</u> <u>or improved</u> their <b>participation in social activities</b>
89% of members surveyed reported that they <u>maintained or increased</u> their comfort level in using technology (computers, tablets, smartphones)
91% of members surveyed reported that they <u>maintained or</u> <u>increased</u> their <b>use of technology in their daily lives</b>
98% of members surveyed reported that they <u>maintained or increased</u> their level of comfort interacting in the community

These results, combined with data from language tests and quality of life questionnaires, support the positive feedback we hear from our members each day and demonstrate the effects our program is having on their quality of life.

Our volunteers make our world go round. Our programs and services wouldn't run without them. They bring a wider range of skills and experiences to our program than would be possible with just staff. This past year, our cadre of more than 200 volunteers in Maywood, West Orange and throughout our ten Aphasia Communication Groups, have clocked in more than 7,000 hours of service.

She works tirelessly with our members in many of our groups including Something Special, cooking, our Ad Journal and more. Additionally, she has been serving as a first responder volunteer with the Paramus Community Response Team (CERT) for the past 14 years.

# Caring for our CAREGIVERS

On any given day here at the Center, you'll find a multitude of caregivers who bring their loved ones to our program and stay the entire day to assist them in getting around the building as they go from one group to another or set up their meals before the lunch break begins or just choose to be here to support them in their recovery efforts. But one of the most serendipitous outcomes of their caregiving efforts is the comradery and friendships they have forged with one another and the benefits they reap from leaning on one another. This has been as valuable to them as the services their loved ones are receiving at the Center.

We address our caregivers' needs as much as we do our members with aphasia. Since the first day our Center opened, we have offered free caregiver support groups, led by professional life coaches, at both our West Orange and Maywood locations. Additionally we offer a free caregiver support group twice a month in Bridgewater at the Shimon and Sara Birnbaum JCC, home to one of our ten Aphasia Communication Groups. Our support groups provide much needed emotional support and valuable resources available to them and their loved ones with aphasia. To them, this is the one place in the world where they can feel understood, can discuss their concerns in a private manner without judgement and are supported when sharing their troubles about caring for their loved ones.

We recognize that informational support was needed to manage the demands of a caregiver and recently introduced a new speakers program in Maywood in which outside speakers meet with our caregivers to address their social, emotional and informational needs. Recent speakers included an elder care attorney, a SHIP (State Health Insurance Program) counselor, a professional organizer, and a nurse/ certified health coach. Other events planned for the year are yoga session and a speaker on stress management.



### **Our Own League** of Champions

ne of the most popular groups we offer is a Fantasy Football League in which Center members use technology and assistive devices to participate. Each week members get to choose players and discuss the latest events in football. The winner of this past semester's league, Ed Morgan, received an autographed football from Harry Carson, former Captain of the NY Giants and a multiple Super Bowl winner.

# Our journey has led us all over the state

ur fifteen year journey to help people with aphasia and their families build a better quality of life has taken us on a path less travelled, one that has introduced Aphasia Communication Groups that are now located in ten NJ counties. Our newest group just recently opened in North Bergen at the public library where all conversations are led in Spanish.

With a first Group launched in 2013, there are now ten Groups operating in NJ: in Bridgewater (Somerset County); in Haddonfield (Camden County); in Hammonton (Atlantic County); in Maywood (Bergen County); in Monroe (Middlesex County); in Morristown (Morris County); in North Bergen (Hudson County); in Scotch Plains (Union County); and two in Toms River (Ocean County).

Our journey throughout the state has taught us that people with aphasia require and want ongoing engagement in therapeutic activities in order to improve their communication skills to a point where they can communicate independently.

# WEST ORANGE Holds Oscar Party For Their Cast of Characters in ADLER HOSPITAL

Adler Aphasia Center prides itself on using the *Life Participation Approach to Aphasia*, a holistic service model that offers concrete strategies pertaining to a person's environment, life situation, personal identity, attitude and feelings, in addition to their language impairment. Our staff at our West Orange program at JCC MetroWest took this approach to another level when it offered a creative writing group to its members last semester in order to provide them with an opportunity to practice their reading skills. Members of this group created the story lines each week incorporating a medical topic for a humorous soap opera called "Adler Hospital." They had an opportunity to practice their reading and acting skills as they dressed in costume and held up props, with the culmination of an Oscar party for their efforts at the end of the semester.
